In a similar vein, Sundaresan (2024) and Thirumalai (2023) argue that rural society is neither static nor inert; rather, it functions as a continuously evolving and adaptive entity in which tradition and change develop in tandem. Raghunathan (2025) and Ramanathan (2024) have interpreted R.K. Narayan's **Malgudi** as a microcosm of rural-social structure, wherein daily life, local institutions, and social relationships play pivotal roles. Analyzing the impacts of economic change, agrarian crises, and migration, Bhattacharya (2025) and Chidambaram (2024) have demonstrated that rural life remains resilient and adaptive, despite being fraught with struggle. Furthermore, Kothandaraman (2023) identifies agriculture as the bedrock of rural identity, while Mukhopadhyay (2025), Venkataraghavan (2024), and Manoharan (2023) establish education, migration, and social mobility as the primary catalysts for change.

Conversely, numerous studies have offered analyses focused on specific social dimensions of rural life—such as caste, gender, and the environment—thereby fostering a deeper understanding



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of rural reality. Iyer (2025), Lakshminarayan (2024), and Rajendran (2023) have clarified that, in R.K. Narayan's fiction, caste exists as an intrinsic social structure that manifests not through overt conflict, but rather through daily interactions, traditions, and social norms. Analyzing gender roles within rural society, Deshpande (2025) and Nirvani (2022) have demonstrated that, despite their roles often appearing circumscribed, women make significant contributions to maintaining social equilibrium and moral order. From an environmental perspective, Goswami (2025), Natesh (2024), Elangovan (2023), and Ayyaraj (2022) have depicted rural life as a sphere impacted by ecological crises, climate change, and the depletion of natural resources—a setting in which nature emerges not merely as a backdrop, but as an active narrative element. Furthermore, Srinivasan (2024), Gopalakrishnan (2023), and Balasubramanyam (2023) have highlighted the processes of balance and adjustment between tradition and change, establishing that societal transformation in rural contexts is often gradual and consensus-driven. Belaku (2022), Kovilan (2022), and Pallavik (2022) have demonstrated—by presenting Malgudi as a symbolic rural construct—that this locale represents both continuity and change. Thus, the comprehensive literature review indicates that the portrayal of rural life in Indian English fiction constitutes a complex and multifaceted discourse, deeply intertwined with profound social, cultural, and ecological processes.

His works prioritize those facets of rural existence that illuminate human, ethical, and cultural experiences, while numerous complex social and structural issues receive comparatively less attention. However, for this very reason, it is also argued that Narayan's realism is limited in its ability to encompass the full spectrum of social complexities. He accords relatively less space to the harsh and arduous aspects of rural life; consequently, his portrayal can sometimes appear idealistic. Thus, while his "selective realism" on one hand highlights literary aesthetics and human sensibilities, on the other, it raises the question of whether or not it succeeds in presenting the complete truth of rural society.

Another significant criticism regarding Narayan's portrayal of rural life is that his works present structural inequalities—such as caste, class, and economic disparity—in a relatively limited manner. Historically, Indian rural society has been characterized by complex social divisions and inequalities, which exert a profound influence on people's lives, opportunities, and social status. Although Narayan does not entirely deny the existence of these elements, he does not make them the central themes of his stories. Consequently, his depiction of rural life sometimes conveys the impression of a harmonious and balanced society, wherein social conflicts appear relatively infrequent. From a modern sociological perspective, this is considered a significant limitation, as contemporary studies place particular emphasis on these structural factors in order to

R.K. Narayan's novels can be considered highly authentic from both historical and cultural perspectives, as it offers a realistic reflection of the lifestyle, traditions, and social behaviors characteristic of Indian society during that era. The glimpses of small towns and villages found in his literature serve as a valuable aid in understanding the social milieu of early and mid-twentieth-century India. However, it is also evident that his perspective does not offer a comprehensive sociological analysis. Narayan's primary objective has been to illuminate human experiences, emotions, and moral dilemmas, rather than to undertake an in-depth analysis of structural inequalities or political conflicts. This explains why issues such as caste, class, or economic disparity appear only to a limited extent in his literary works. Nevertheless, this selectivity defines his literary purpose—one in which he seeks to offer readers a sensitive and intuitive experience. Thus, while his portrayal of rural life reflects a historical reality, it is more appropriate to interpret it not as a complete social document, but rather as a literary interpretation.

2. Widespread Changes in Rural Society Due to Modern Influences – The study clearly demonstrates that modern influences have brought about profound and multifaceted transformations in the economic, social, and cultural fabric of rural society. While rural life in Narayan's era was relatively static and grounded in traditional structures, in the contemporary context, it has become far more dynamic and diverse.
