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Abstract

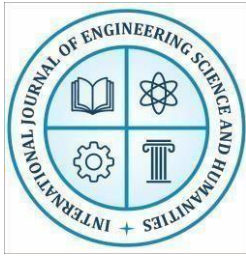

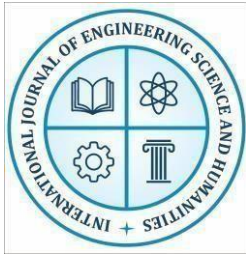
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scholarly inquiry. It concludes that investing in e-library infrastructure significantly supports academic excellence.

Accessibility and Availability of Learning Resources

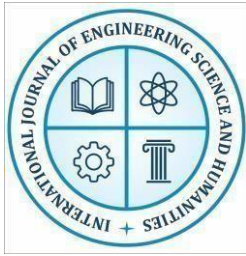

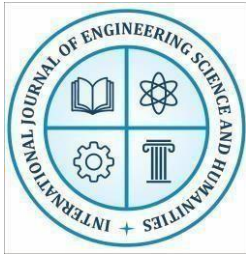

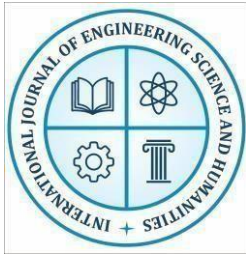

Challenges in Access and Usage

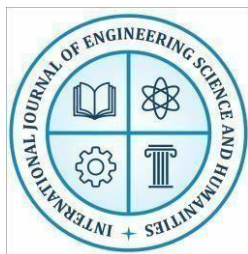
