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Exploring Themes of Individuality and Social Conflict in the Writings of Shobha De

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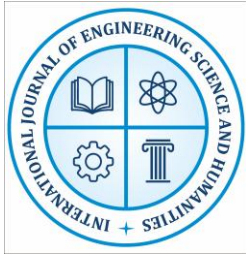
Abstract

However, De realistically portrays that individuality does not automatically solve emotional problems. Her characters often experience loneliness and dissatisfaction despite achieving



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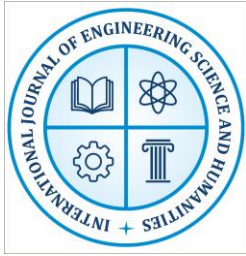

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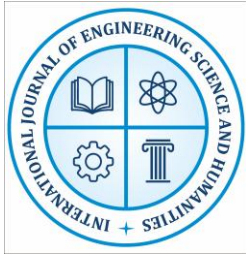

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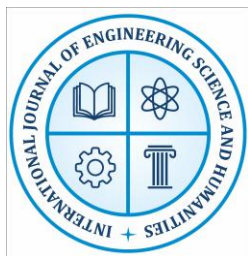
